

The Patent Novelty Paper Fastener.

For binding books, papers, pamphlets, etc.; for putting down carpets or matting; making frames, garters, fancy work, etc., upholstering furniture, Putting up window curtains: exhibiting goods in window, labelling trunks, boxes, etc., etc.

For the use of lawyers, printers, salesmen, merchants, and almost everybody, it is one of the most desirable articles ever offered.

This little tool is a perfect substitute for the expensive and complicated machines costing hundreds of dollars each, which are now used for binding catalogues, pamphlets, magazines, etc., etc., and a boy with this article can bind from two to three thousand pamphlets per day, and make better work than can be done by stitching.

For the use of lawyers, etc., it is far preferable to an eyeletting machine, as the work is neater and stronger, while it is done at one tenth the cost, and in one-tenth the time. Wherever introduced, this article has displaced all other paper fasteners, while for a hundred other purposes it has no equal.

For ringing show cards, calendars, pamphlets, circulars, etc., or for hanging up photographs or light frames the suspension rings herewith furnished are the cheapest, strongest, and handsomest in the market. These staples are furnished in various lengths, 3-16, 1-4, 3-8 and 1-2 inch, put up in packages of 100 each. The suspension rings are handsomely boxed, 500 in each box. The price of the staples per 1000 is uniform for all the various sizes.

Directions for using the Staple Driver Alone.

Place a staple in the slot, then set the tool squarely against the paper, etc., first laying the same upon a soft wooden block, old paper book, or something of the sort.

Then drive the staple home. To clinch it, turn the paper over, bend the projecting points slightly together, cover them with the slotted end of the tool, and repeat the blow, which will clinch them most effectually.
